DLA Partners with the Sustainable Libraries Initiative

The Delaware Library Association (DLA) has joined a growing list of state library Associations that have partnered with the Sustainable Libraries Initiative (SLI). A benefit of DLA membership is one-year access to the plethora of resources curated by SLI.

From the press release: “Through this partnership, DLA members will join a nationwide community of practice who are using SLI-curated tools to uncover ways that their libraries and communities can understand, adapt to, and help lessen the effects of climate change. These tools include hundreds of best practices proven by peers, access to an archive of professional

development focused on the core value of sustainability, program examples, a vetted vendor list, and a custom CO2 calculator to help members estimate their current institutional greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and measure reductions, and custom publicity pieces to help libraries tell their sustainability story.”

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT GRANT

Up To \$2,000 Award | DLA Members Only

The objective of a DLA funded grant is to provide funds that help cover library programs or exhibitions that foster a sense of community engagement, and/or present timely topics of interest in areas such as civics, humanities, pop culture, world events, literature, health, family, or other areas as deemed appropriate.

REQUIREMENTS

- Application must be submitted by an active DLA member or from a library with an active DLA institution membership.
- Total grant funds available is \$2,000. The expectation is that multiple awards will be issued, typically in the \$500-1,000 range.
- The grant application must be completed online.
- Mailed applications will not be accepted
- All promotional pieces must include the DLA logo and mission statement.
- Final report must be submitted after conclusion of awarded program.

HOW TO APPLY

- Review the grant applicant fact sheet.
- Complete the online application.
- Application period is **February 23 - March 30, 2026**
- Applicants will be notified mid to late May 2026.

DASL Professional Development Day

DASL hosted our first annual professional development day on October 10, 2025 for school librarians! Everyone was invited, regardless of membership, and we gathered in two buildings- ASPIRA Academy in Newark and Central Elementary in Dover.

During the morning's in-person session, we shared ideas and information about many library topics such as author visits, book fairs, curriculum support, and advocacy. People met and exchanged contact info, learned from each other, and recommended books. Door prizes were given out and many people also took home free books!

Our afternoon session was held virtually – several people presented about topics of interest: serving on the Caldecott Committee, how to use social media effectively, an introduction to BookBreaks, a tour from Follett, news about the consortium, ways to partner up with the public libraries, and how our DSCYF libraries serve students. According to the follow up survey, about 50% of attendees are now considering joining DASL and 97% of them want to continue this event every year!

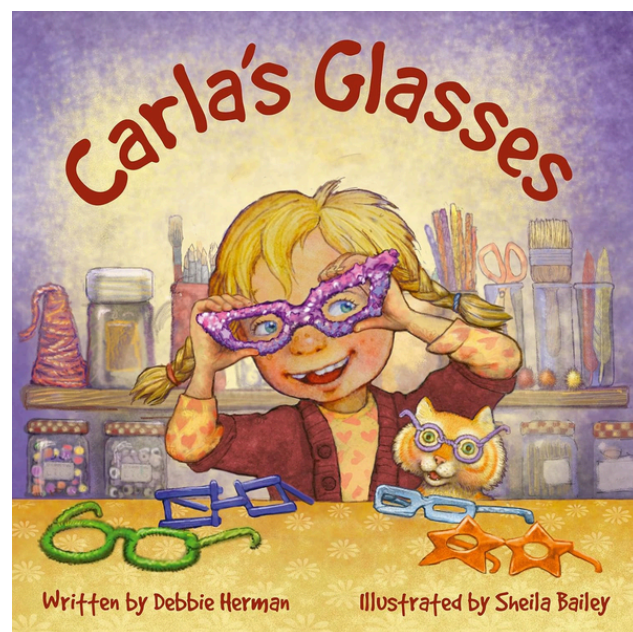
- Participate with just one grade level or one class from each grade level

"I had the pleasure of attending the 2025 MLA/DLA Annual Library Conference in Ocean City, MD. I can honestly say I was impressed with the conference in its entirety.

My conference choices focused on executive leadership sessions, but before I delve into my experience there, I must give a most gracious thanks to the Delaware Library Association for granting me a scholarship for my 1st conference attendance.

The opening keynote by Lady Brion inspired me as she spoke of the powerful impact of librarians in her journey through life. The way she recited her poems bellowed and echoed through my spirit. Additionally, she took my question on how the current advancements in artificial intelligence and how it could never replace human ingenuity. Additionally, she responded that AI has a place in art, if it proceeds forward ethically and with full credit and transparency given to an artist's original content.

After networking with so many new faces, I attended the "Leading While Black" session on surviving executive leadership. The insights and strategies they offered from their experiences

gave this e-suite leader (me) a moment of empathy and self-awareness. After listening and seeing commonalities, I left feeling renewed and seen. Baby Storytimes for Improved Maternal Health

Bernadette Davis, Childrens Librarian at the Brandywine Hundred Library, was inspired to write a blog post for the Association for Library Service to Children after a mother of a five-month-old shared how deeply she missed attending story time. In the article, Bernadette Davis emphasized how this familiar library program does far more than promote early literacy, it supports mental health and strengthens family well-being by helping to reduce maternal loneliness. The popularity of story times at the Brandywine Hundred Library, and others across the State underscore the very real, and often unseen, impact these programs have on our community.

Excerpt from the blog post:

Book Babies, our library's weekly story time for infants, had just wrapped when a mom approached me with her five-month-old daughter in her arms. "I'm so sorry we haven't been here for a while," she began, "but her

naps changed, and we couldn't get out the door on time..."

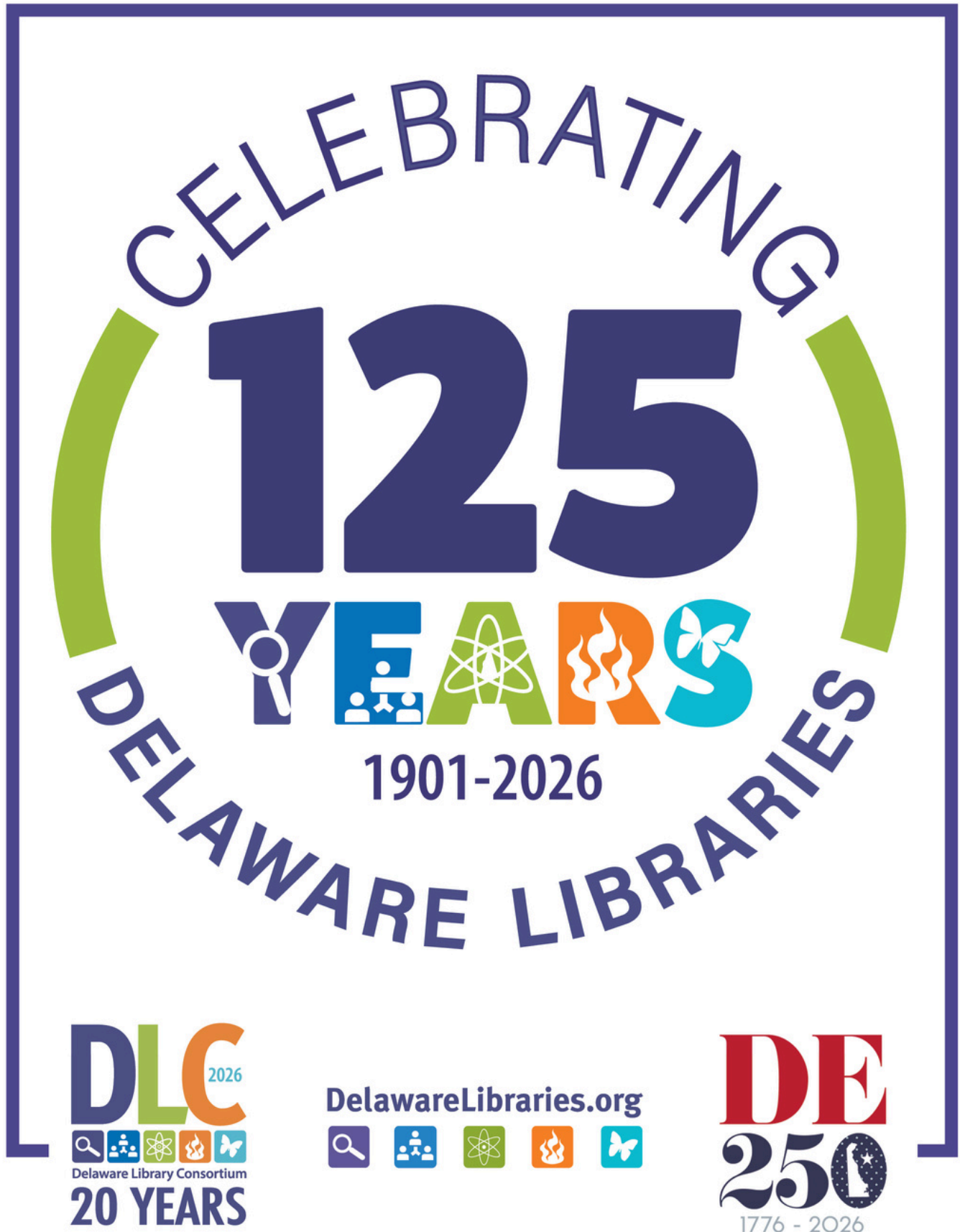
She paused and I saw that she was beginning to tear up, so I jumped in with über-cheerfulness. "It's fine! I'm so glad you're here today!" I assured her. "Look, you made it out the door, and you're both dressed; that's huge! Congrats!"

The mom relaxed a bit, and spoke like she was making a confession. "This has been so great for us, this program. I've really missed coming."

I noticed the mom said **she** had missed attending, not the baby. This was an important reminder for me that library programs offered for babies are not just beneficial for the infants; they serve as critical support for the parents caring for those children.
